

Information leaflet e-invoicing the Dutch central government: information for suppliers

Do you want to send an electronic invoice (e-invoice) to your client at the central government? In this leaflet we explain how to do this.

Please note: your client can make additional arrangements with you on e-invoicing.

Do I have to send e-invoices?

Yes, the central government has made e-invoicing mandatory for all assignments, orders, and contracts.

What is an e-invoice?

An e-invoice looks like a normal invoice, but it contains codes as well. These codes are structured in a fixed manner. This way, the invoice can be processed directly in the administration of the client.

Note that a pdf file is not an e-invoice.

How can I send an e-invoice?

You can send an e-invoice to the central government:

- via the supplier portal
- via a service provider
- via Digipoort
- via an accounting programme

It depends on your situation which way suits you best. You can find more information on the <u>e-invoicing helpdesk's</u> Dutch-language website.

Which conditions must my e-invoice meet?

To process an e-invoice it is important that the right data have been entered in the correct way. You can find more information on which data an e-invoice to the Dutch central government should contain in the Guideline Basisfactuur Rijk. For instance:

- Order number/reference (enter this in the OrderReference field)
- Organisation Identification Number (Organisatieidentificatienummer, OIN, in Dutch)

You can also consult the <u>Dutch Tax and Customs Administration's</u> <u>invoice requirements</u> (in Dutch).

Please note!

Incorrect invoices, for instance incomplete invoices, will not be processed and therefore not paid. Even if your invoice contains a small mistake, you will receive an error message in your billing system or a notification via e-mail.

Laws and regulations

The obligation for e-invoicing is the result of an <u>EU Directive</u> which has been transposed into <u>Dutch law</u> (in Dutch).
